### Galveston to host annual conference

THE LAST TIME THE TEXAS ASA scheduled to meet in Galveston for its annual conference, an unexpected visitor arrived—Hurricane Ike.

On Sept. 13, 2008, Hurricane Ike hit Galveston as a high category-2 hurricane with winds of 110 mph, forcing the Texas ASA to cancel its annual conference. Hurricane Ike was the third costliest hurricane ever to make landfall in the United States and the third major hurricane of the 2008 Atlantic hurricane season.

"Hurricane Ike had a say in it (the annual conference) the last time we tried to meet there," remarked Texas State Commissioner Glenn Morrison, who is looking forward to this year's conference. "Our annual conference is always a great time to get together, conduct our business, reflect on the year and plan for our future. It will be great to have it in Galveston again-minus, of course, another hurricane."

Galveston will host the Texas ASA on Oct. 7-10 sponsored by Districts 31 and 36 at the Galveston Island Hilton Resort with more than 120 people expected from all of the districts within the Texas ASA.

The registration fee is \$50 for council members and non-council members, with a deadline of Sept. 27. Anyone who needs to cancel should contact District 36 by Sept. 15 to get a refund.

Besides the business portion of the conference, different activities have been planned including golf and bay fishing on

Friday, and a shopping tour on Saturday. Cost of the golf is \$60, the bay fishing is \$35, and the shopping tour is \$20.

The golf will be played at the Moody Gardens golf course with a tee time of 1 p.m. Prizes will be given for longestdrive and closest-to-the-pin.

Those fishing will need a license, with at least 20 people needed for the trip. Prizes will be awarded for the largest catch and the most fish caught. If there are at least 20 people fishing, they should meet in the hotel lobby at noon Friday. If the fishing trip doesn't make, the money will be refunded.

The shopping tour will be 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday and includes transportation and lunch. Those going on the shopping tour should meet in the hotel lobby at 9:45 a.m. on Saturday.

# JO state tourneys show well in 2010

"It's been a good year," said Parker."We had 449 teams playing in our state tournaments. This is down a little (15 teams from last year) because one of our Class C state tournaments failed to make. If it had, we would have surpassed the numbers from last year."

The 449 teams doesn't include the 71 teams that played in the regional tournament, plus 105 that participated in the Gold Territory tourney in Houston.

The Pixie Tournaments for six-under and eight-under girls were impressive this year with a total of 136 teams. These players will move on to play 10-under, 12-under, 14-under and 18-under in the Texas program, and it certainly is an indication of the popularity of the grassroots development fostered by the Texas ASA. □

SOME PEOPLE INVOLVED IN softball wear a number of different hats. District 30 commissioner Alfred Macias is one of them.

Besides being the district commissioner since 2008, Macias is a deputy state UIC, business owner (Ace Pest Control

since 1989), sponsor and player on a coed slow pitch team Sod Nutz, which started out originally as a slow pitch team.

But as District 30 commissioner, he gives credit where credit is due.

"My staff does a great job," said Macias. "I can't do it alone obviously and I appreciate their support."

The support of his staff was evident when the annual state awards for 2009 were announced with Bryan-College Station tops in total registrations, 1,101, and most adult teams registered, 975.

Besides Macias, District 30 includes a JO commissioner, Fred Burris, district UIC, James Brau and four deputy commissioners: Raymond Bradley, Jeri Marsh, David Hudspeth and Crystal Dahlquist.

It's a dedicated, committed bunch of people who registered more than 1,000 teams and 104 umpires in 2009, which is no small accomplishment considering some ASA local associations register less than 1,000 teams, while College Station is only a district.

Macias realizes he has a good situation because running a business full-time would normally be all one person could do and not leave much or very little time to work with softball.

"But I am fortunate because the business takes care of itself," said Macias." All I do is collect checks and make out the payroll. It's a hands-on business and I have my family involved. This allows me time to work on softball."

## Hit Squad dominates 14-under Class B




