

ISC WORLD TOURNAMENT:

QC Area Teams Struggle at Start of Tourney

Loggers Shut Down Outlaws, Force Holds On Against Randy's A's

In past years, teams such as the Quad City Sox have had a good showing when the Quad Cities have hosted the International Softball Congress' Fastpitch Softball World Tournament but this year saw the area teams struggle against the world's best to even score runs.

The World Tournament, which this year includes a consolation tournament (ISC II), a Legends tourney and one for 21 and under, continues through this Saturday at Moline's Greenvalley Sports Complex.

The Quad Cities will bid for the tournament again in 2015 after hosting it in 2009, 2011 and this year.

CAL-STATE BUILDERS 12, WALCOTT MERCHANTS 1

In the first game featuring a team from the Quad Cities on Opening Day Saturday, the Walcott Merchants kept the Cal-State Builders in check for a time but had trouble getting on base themselves. The end result was a 12-1 shellacking after a run-rule shortened six inning contest.

In the first inning, Cal-State's Jenner Christiansen got things going with an RBI single to left. He finished the game with four RBI's to pace the Builders' offense. An RBI grounder to short brought in another Builder in the inning to give Cal-State an early 2-0 lead.

An RBI single in the third by Cal-State's Ricky Sivila made things 3-0 in favor of Cal-State but that was all they could score until the fifth when they blew the game open a bit wider.

In the fifth, with runners at first and third and two outs, second base was stolen and then Christiansen came through again, this time with a 2-run single to left. Ricky Moore drove him in with an RBI double to left and Caleb Keeshig drove in the last run of the frame with an RBI single to left to make things 7-0 in favor of the team from San Mateo, California.

Keith Peterson was the primary offensive highlight for the Walcott team as he got on base all three times he was up including in the bottom of the fifth when he hit a leadoff single and then was driven in by a triple off the bat of Kevin Sexton to make things 7-1.

Cal-State loaded the bases in the

next inning before Christiansen was walked to bring in another run, Donovan Chilton hit a 2-run RBI single to center and Keeshig drove in another run with an RBI single to third to creat the final score of 12-1 in favor of Cal-State.

"This was a good start," Jenner Christiansen said after the win. "I am happy. Everybody played well and we pitched well. Once we got the ISC jitters out, we were able to hit the ball well. I am one of our top RBI hitters usually, having played in the the three spot most of the season."

SCARBOROUGH FORCE 4, RANDY A'S 3:

This game didn't start out as close as the final score but then falling apart late proved to be a common theme for the Force early on in this week's tournament as they also blew a late 2-0 lead over the Minnesota Angels after getting past the A's

The battle between the Force and the A's Sunday pitted two teams from Canada as Scarborough hails from O-tario, Canada and the Randy A's are from Invermere, British Columbia.

Don Scott, the Force's pitcher, was the story of this game as he kept the A's in check and off the basepaths almost the entire game until the seventh when things got a little hairy. Having a 9-strikeout performance helped in this effort.

Scott struck out the side in the first before the Force gave him some run support in the bottom of the frame as Andy Skelton hit an RBI single to center and

Andrew Scott drove in a run with a grounder to second.

With the score 2-0 Scarborough, Dave Brownhill hit a disputed double to left in the second inning to plate yet another Force run. Randy's A's manager came out and argued that the ball had gone foul but the umpires ultimately won out.

In the top of the third, the A's got on the board as Randy Potskin hit an RBI single to center, plating Danny Fulton who hit a hard triple to left for the first hit off Scott.

The score stayed 3-1 until the bottom of the fourth when the Force's Jeremy Tracy hit a solo shot over the right field fence to give his team a 4-1 cushion. The Force would end up needing that run too as the A's were able to take advantage of "lazy" pitching by Scott in the final frame to make things interesting.

In the bottom of the sixth, Fulton and Jessi Potskin hit doubles, with Potskin's bringing in two runs to make things 4-3 Force. On the next play though, a grounder to short, the runner at third was thrown out at home, saving the game for the Force. A double-play followed and the Force escaped with the 1-run victory.

"I got a little lazy at the end there," Scott said. "It is a good team win when you win those types of games. We knew we needed to get things started and get the ball in play. That play at home was much needed. This was the first time we had ever faced them."

SOOKE LOGGERS 4, <u>KITCHENER BELL</u> CARTAGEOUTLAWS 1:

While the Force and A's hadn't met before Sunday's contest, when the Sooke Loggers from British Columbia and the Kitchener Bell Cartage Outlaws from Ontario met on Tuesday afternoon, it was the second time during the tournament they had faced each other. The first game was a 10-3 victory for the Loggers but this Tuesday battle was a lot tighter and left the Loggers thankful for the 17-strikeout performance by their pitcher Scott Lienh

The first two runs in the game were scored off errors as neither

team had much luck getting the ball out of the infield until the final frame.

The Outlaws struck first as a walk, bunt and errant throw from third to first enabled a run to score putting Kitchener in front 1-0.

After threatening in the third with a runner at third, the Loggers scored their first run in the fourth as a passed ball got a runner to third and then he came in off an errant throw from the catcher to first.

The game stayed knotted at 1-1 as Lieph struck out the side in the third and fifth inning en route to his 17-K game.

In the top of the seventh, the wheels came off for the Outlaws though. After a double by Logger Kyle Cowick, an errant throw from third to first was enough for him to score the goahead run. A few batters later, Scott Newitt put the game away with a 2-run triple to left to make things 4-1 in favor of Sooke.

The Outlaws closed out the game with two runners on before Lieph shut them down with his third strikeout of the inning, fittingly enough.

"I'd say this was not my best pitching of the season," Lieph said. I ran out of gas near the end. It was definitely nice to get those insurance runs in the seventh. We are usually good with our bats but we have been struggling lately. It will come back though."

ISC II: EMERSON ACES 8, HICKSON REDS 1:

The Hickson Reds struck first in this ISC II (Consolation) Tournament game Tueday but Emerson had the last laugh.

After Hickson's Darryl Wharram hit a solo shot in the top of the second to put his team on top 1-0, the Aces replied by loading the bases off a hit and two walks before Charlie Malson hit a grand slam over the center field fence in the bottom of the inning. Emerson went on to win the game 8-1.

QUAD CITIES RIVER BANDITS:

Rubber Games Leave Bandits Breaking Even

First Shutout Loss of Second Half Followed by Shutout of TimberRattlers

The most recent homestand for the Quad Cities River Bandits was not as successful as the previous one.

After sweeping through the Peoria Chiefs for a 4-game run, the Quad Cities River Bandits welcomed in the Clinton LumberKings and the Wisconsin Timber Rattlers this past week and found themselves having to play rubber games in both 3-game series to determine the series winner.

On Wednesday, the Clinton series began with Clinton drawing first blood as the LumberKings came out on top 7-5.

The River Bandits struck first though as a 2-out RBI single by Danry Vasquez plated Carlos Correa who had hit a 2-out double to left. This gave QC a 1-0 lead.

Correa came through in the bottom of the third also as he hit an RBI double to center to make things 2-0.

Clinton didn't even get its first hit until the top of the fourth. In the fifth, Clinton got an RBI hit literally off of QC pitcher Lance McCullersas a line drive hit McCullers just above the glove and then ricocheted to short, enabling the LumberKings to score and make things 2-1 QC.

After Clinton tied things at 2-2, they loaded the bases with two outs in the seventh and a walk gave

them a 3-2 lead. D.J. Peterson came up next and hit the biggest blow of the game, a grand slam homer over the leftfield fence to put Clinton on top 7-2.

The Bandits scored in the bottom of the seventh and then saw Bobby Borchering hit an RBI double to left in the eighth but the closest QC would get would be the final tally of 7-5.

Thursday, the Bandits bounced back with a 2-1 victory. Rio Ruiz hit an RBI double to right in the bottom of the second, Borchering hit an RBI single to center in the bottom of the eighth to provide some breathing room and then Peterson struck again for the LumberKings with a homer to right in the top of the ninth to cut the QC lead in half.

In the rubber game Friday, on

Autism Awareness Night, the Bandits wore special jerseys for the event and then took a 4-0 lead.

Clinton challenged yet again but fell short as the Bandits came away with a 7-3 victory.

A Vasquez RBI single in the first put QC on top 1-0. Bryan Blasik's 2-run double to left in the second followed by a Teoscar Hernandez RBI single increased the lead to 4-0

After Clinton found the scoreboard, Tony Kemp hit his first homer for the Bandits, a 2-run shot over the right-field fence, to boost the Bandits lead to 6-1. Correa was right on his heels with his eighth homer of the year to give the Bandits an even bigger lead.

Clinton tried to chip away at the large lead but fell short, giving QC the series victory.

Wisconsin then came in on Saturday and limited the Bandits to just one hit en route to a 7-0 victory, the first shutout loss for the Bandits during the second half of the season

Sunday was the only game in this series when the Bandits offense and itching worked together for a win. Blanking the Timber Rattlers, the River Bandits were able to come away with a 5-0 victory, all the offense coming from two homeruns from Hernandez.

Brian Holmes, Zach Morton and Juan Minaya combined on the mound to silence the Wisconsin bats while Hernandez struck with a 3-run homer in the third and a 2-run shot in the eighth.

The Bandits also turned their second triple play of the year in the seventh. With two runners on, Wisconsin's Lance Roenicke hit a fly ball to left with the runners going. Not only was the runner on first caught off the base but the runner on second was at third, and stayed there for a time even after he was called out for leaving early as well.

The Bandits offense was put back to sleep in the Monday rubber game as QC ended the 6-game homestand with an even 3-3 record after their 9-1 loss to Wisconsin on getaway day.

The River Bandits didn't get a hit until the sixth inning. By that time, they were already down 7-0 to the TimberRattlers. The Rattlers finished with 15 hits compared to three for QC, including an RBI double off the bat of Austin Elkins.

After going to Clinton for a 3game series this week, the Bandits return to Modern Woodmen Park Saturday to host the Burlington Bees and the first-place Cedar Rapids Kernels.

There are only 10 home games left before the 2013 playoffs get underway.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL:

Three Vikings finished in double figures as Molly Etheridge and Jessica Baids both scored 12 and senior Amy Hicks added 10 points. Marissa Pezzopane also scored eight for the Vikings.

Hicks had 7 rebounds as well. Baids' double-double helped the Vikings defeat Club Municipal again on Wednesday by a 55-31 margin.

The lead eventually grew to 58-33 by the half.

Roth ended up hitting six of his 10 shots from beyond the arc to finish with 20 points. **United Township's** Nic Hoepfner scored 16 and Ben Ryan had 9 boards for the Vikings.

The Vikes shot 57 percent from the field including 12-of-27 from 3-point land. The rebouhnd advantage also ended in the Vikings' favor as they led 40-17 and forced 19 turnovers.

In the next game on Wednesday, the Viking men fell in overtime 80-79 to America De Sap Jose Do Rip Preto. The host team had players of 7'1", 6'10" and 6'9" and outshot the Vikings 43-20 from the free throw line when it came to shot attempts.

The Vikings fell 78-72 to this team on Monday after battling back from a 39-35 halftime deficit. The Vikings only took 18 trips to the free throw stripe while Flamingo shot 58 free throw attempts in the game.

Schlitter led the Vikes with 11 points and nine boards, Jurgutis and Ryan had 10 points and Johnson had 9 boards for Augustana in the loss.

VIKING FOOTBALL: Vikings Picked to Finish Fourth in CCIW PRESS RELEASE:

After winning four of its last five games last year to finish 5-5 overall and 4-3 in the College Conference of Illinois & Wisconsin, Augustana has been picked for fourth place in the 2013 pre-season football coaches poll.

The Vikings picked up 28 points to finish just ahead of fifth place Elmhurst, which was 10-2 and 6-1 a year ago.

On the restart, it was Veloz Jr's V43 that continued to lead. By Lap 11, the V43 had checked out on the rest of the field, setting sail to his fifth feature victory of the year.

The real race was second-throughsixth. Side-by-side by action for most of the middle part of the event made it exciting. Cody Bauman took the runner-up spot with Matt Werner and Brock Bauman rounding out the Top 4.

Greg Durbin took his No. 8 vehicle to victory lane under caution in the U-Pull-A-Parts/Cimco IMCA Modifieds 20 Lap feature. The race saw seven yellow flags, including the one that officially ended the event on the final lap.

Durbin started on the outside of Row 5 and was already in second position by the time the first yellow waved on Lap 4. He passed Leland Bushong on the restart to assume the lead.

Bushong's night got worse from there. With three laps to go, Bushong spun from seventh spot. He still rallied for a ninth-place finish out of 15 cars.

Eric Barnes had a nice night coming through field, starting right in front of Durbin. Barnes finished second with Jason Bahrs, Brian Bushong and Craig Crawford rounding out the Top 5.

The Mod Lites came close to exceeding the caution limit in their 12 lap feature. Seven cautions were brought out in the first eight laps. Series points leader Shon Sanders made quick work getting to the lead after the first yellow flag.

Sanders restarted in fourth and was leading off turn two on the opening lap. He and his No. 4 machine threaded the needle between Bryan Brinker and Mike Pershing on the restart on Lap 2. Pershing finished sixth and led the only lap Sanders didn't lead. Brinker came home in second.

Jarrett Franzen took home the Weber Auto Group Street Stocks trophy for the sixth time at QCS in 2013. A wreck involving Rob Nylin and series points leader, Chris Lawrence, on Lap 2 may spoiled Lawrence's night.

Although Lawrence finished second, the man tailing him in the points won the feature. Cary Brown finished third and Gary

Weatherington finished fourth.
