Farm Tavern, Patsy's undefeated Host Twins on a roll – could play twice on Thursday

The Final Four on the winners' side are impressive and have each carved out identical 3-0 win-loss records – much as expected. Were there surprises? Sure, but only minimally as #6 Madison WI Farm Tavern dominated #3 Orillia Quaker Riversharks 6-1 last night. TWINS IN THE HUNT – The Host Hallman Twins (3-1) made it two-in-a row with an impressive two-way effort, dispatching the Saskatoon SK Aspen Interiors 3-1 much to the delight of a partisan and supportive home-tiown crowd. Aspen's Darrell Joy scored in T-1 on a wild pitch, and Twins Jody Eidt countered in B-1 crossing the plate after a passed ball. Eidt and Derek Shackleton each collected two hits, including doubles. Eidt was architect of a timely 6th inning double play. Todd Martin got the win, with relief from southpaw Paul Koert. With the score 2-1, 1B Ron White provided the "nail in the coffin" blow with a 6th inning solo homer and a two-run cushion. Twins play today at 9:00 am in a re-match with Ashland, OH Mets and with a win, advance to the 1:00 pm match-up against Ontario rival Orillia Quaker Riversharks.

There are still a dozen teams with a single loss in the secondary bracket and they will be eliminated game-by-game today. Four teams will survive until Championship Saturday.


Today's Question




CASEY AT THE BAT

In 1885, George Hearst purchased the San Francisco Examiner and soon thereafter gave the company to his son – William Randolph Hearst. The younger Hearst invited Ernest L. Thayer, a colleague from Harvard College's Lampoon to write for the Examiner, which he did under the "pen-name" Phin.

In the June 3, 1888 issue of the Examiner, Phin authored a poem we now know as "Casey At The Bat". The poem initially received little attention, however a New Yorker named Archibald Gunter clipped the poem for future use. In August 1888, a comedian De Wolf Hopper was performing at the Wallack Theatre and members of the New York and Chicago baseball clubs were in the audience. Gunter shared "Casey At The Bat" and the poem became legendary from that day forth. On the following page, Diamond Dirt is pleased to present the single most famous baseball poem ever written.

Diamond Dirt is pleased to present the most famous baseball poem ever written:

The Outlook wasn't brilliant for the Mudville nine that day; The score stood four to two, with but one inning to play. And then when Cooney died at first, and Barrows did the same, A sickly silence fellow upon the patrons of the game.

A straggling few got up to go in deep despair. The rest Clung to that hope which springs eternal in the human breast; They thought, if only Casey could get but a whack at that – We'd put up even money, now, with Casey at the bat.

But Flynn preceded Casey, as did also Jimmy Blake, And the former was a lulu and the latter was a cake; So upon that stricken multitude grim melancholy sat, For there seemed but little chance of Casey's getting to bat.

But Flynn let drive a single, to the wonderment of all, And Blake, the much despis-ed, tore the cover off the ball; And when the dust had lifted, and the men saw what had occurred, There was Jimmy safe at second and Flynn a-hugging third.

Then from 5,000 throats and more there rose a lusty yell; It rumbled through the valley, it rattled in the dell; It knocked upon the mountain and recoiled upon the flat, For Casey, mighty Casey, was advancing to the bat.

There was ease in Casey's manner as he stepped into his place; There was pride in Casey's bearing and a smile on Casey's face. And,when responding to the cheers, he lightly doffed his hat, No stranger in the crowd could doubt 'twas Casey at the bat. Ten thousand eyes were on him as he rubbed his hands with dirt; Five thousand tongues applauded when he wiped them on his shirt The while the writhing pitcher ground the ball into his hip, Defiance gleamed in Casey's eye, a sneer curled Casey's lip.

And now the leather-covered sphere came hurtling through the air, And Casey stood a-watching it in haughty grandeur there. Close by the sturdy batsman the ball unheeded sped "That ain't my style," says Casey. "Strike one," the umpire said.

From the benches, black with people, there went up a muffled roar, Like the beating on the storm-waves on a stern and distant shore "Kill him! Kill the umpire!" shouted someone on the stand; And it's likely they'd a-killed him had not Casey raised his hand.

With a smile of Christian Charity great Casey's visage shone; He stilled the rising tumult; he bade the game go on; He signaled to the pitcher, and once more the spheroid flew; But Casey still ignored it, and the umpire said "Strike two."

"Fraud!" called the maddened thousands, & echoed answered fraud; But one scornful look from Casey, and the audience was awed, They saw his face grow stern and cold, they saw his muscles strain, And they knew that Casey wouldn't let that ball go by again.

The sneer is gone from Casey's lip, his teeth are clenched in hate; He pounds with cruel violence his bat upon the plate. And now the pitcher holds the ball, and now he lets it go, And now the air is shattered by the force of Casey's blow.

Oh, somewhere in this favored land the sun is shining bright; The band is playing somewhere, and somewhere hearts are light, And somewhere men are laughing, & somewhere children shout; But there is no joy in Mudville – mighty Casey has struck out. "Phin"

ISC II - California Cruisin' - in a well-organized event

The two California teams in the ISC II the 9th before a controversial call at 3B Tournament of Champions both moved into command of their respective pools with a pair of victories Wednesday, but it was the less heralded A-1/Taylor Farms team from Castro Valley that impressed observers. A-1 began its day with a 5-1 thrashing of the defending champion Tavistock Merchants with John Bishop picking up the win over Ryan Cummings. A-1/Taylor then scored a 5-4 7th-inning walk-off win over the Bucktown Bees as Dave Drotzman picked up the win in relief of Matt Barnes. Bees' Philip Martin was the hard luck loser in relief of Lee Hopkins. California Lumberkings continued its winning ways, edging Pennsylvania **Power** 6-5 (eight innings) before dumping the Hamilton Hawks 7-4. Mike Egerdeen got his second win of the tournament pitching two innings in relief of starter Darren Strang in the first game while Ed Gasper notched his first ISC II victory in the night-cap.


